

## The Nature Conservancy

The Nature Conservancy is a leading conservation organisation working around the world to protect ecologically important lands and waters for nature and people.

Globally we work in more than 35 countries with a staff of nearly 4,000 including 600 scientists. We began working in Australia in 2002 and since then we're proud to have collaborated with a wide array of partners to support conservation efforts across more than 127 million hectares of Australia's lands and waters.

## Great Southern Seascapes Program

Along the southern coast of Australia lie hundreds of bays and estuaries that contain important temperate habitats, including rocky reefs, seagrass meadows, mangrove forests and saltmarshes.

These habitats are home to many unique and iconic species such as handfish, seadragons and giant cuttlefish and play a vital role in supporting healthy fish populations, preventing shorelines from eroding and improving coastal water quality. Yet sadly, the health of our bays and estuaries is in decline and large-scale action is needed to repair coastal habitats and the critical services they provide for the benefit of both people and nature.



## Our approach

Through collaborative, partner-driven projects, we will undertake a number of activities focused on:

1. Protecting and restoring critical marine habitats and their ecosystem services;
2. Inspiring individuals, communities and coastal leaders to value the many ways nature supports people, and to actively engage in coastal conservation; and,
3. Transforming investment, policy and planning to enable large-scale, in-water restoration and conservation.
